About Ecola...

Ecola is a unique Bible study opportunity designed for people 18 and older, who want to study the Scriptures and learn how they apply to life.

The purpose of Ecola is to help students develop a strong personal relationship with the Lord Jesus. We believe that an environment conducive to spiritual growth and relatively free from the influences of modern culture is optimal for this process. A warm supportive family atmosphere, and the seclusion and rugged beauty of the North Oregon Coast provide the setting. Students get to know God personally through time spent in His Word and time spent alone with Him.



And how it works

The study program is divided into three terms leading to a one year diploma.

Each term consists of a set of classes that remain substantially the same from year to year. The entire student body is present at each class. This adds the necessary cohesiveness to the Ecola family concept and creates an atmosphere of togetherness, caring, and sharing.

It is possible to begin Ecola at the start of any term. It is also possible to spread attendance out over a several year period. The requirement for a diploma will be met when the three terms are completed, regardless of the order in which they were attended.

The student has the opportunity to augment the one-year program with several optional courses including missions, and youth ministry.

Campus Facilities

Cannon Beach, Oregon offers an outstanding school location. Ecola leases a portion of the facilities of the beautiful Cannon Beach Conference Center, one of the most widely known nondenominational Bible conference centers in the Western United States.

The school's facilities include a chapel which serves as a classroom, library, and study area. The student dining room offers excellent food prepared by a professional staff. Ecola students share with other guests, a cozy snack shop, a bookstore, and a new gymnasium suitable for basketball, volleyball, weight lifting, and other activities.

Housing consists of separate men's and women's dormitories. Several lounges are available to students, including those attached to both the chapel and the gymnasium. The gym lounge is equipped with a high speed wireless internet connection and several email computers.





Weekdays & Weekends

A normal week at Ecola consists of four class periods per day Monday through Friday. Mornings begin at 9:00 a.m. with a class devotional time followed by the first lecture. A thirty minute coffee break mid-morning is followed by the second lecture and evening classes are from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. After class, students can enjoy volleyball, basketball, the snack bar, or walks on the beach, among other activities. Wednesday evening is free for outreach activities with the evening lectures moved to afternoon.

Afternoons are free for study, work, recreation, and Christian outreach. Afternoons may also include classroom sessions for the various program options.

Class attendance is very important to a student's success at Ecola. Therefore students only miss lectures due to illness or through prearrangement.

Saturdays are normally free and students often take advantage of the beach, gymnasium, or local hiking trails. Sundays bring a commitment to attend a local church of the student's choice.

Recreation

Adjacent to the campus is a city park, with ball fields and tennis courts. The beach, just one block from campus, is one of the most beautiful shorelines in the United States.

The Pacific Ocean is cold and often rough, but with proper equipment and precautions, it can offer a wide range of exciting possibilities. With no cost at all, students can enjoy winter storms, tide pools, whale watching, surfing and a host of other activities.

The surrounding area has miles of outstanding hiking trails. Wildlife abounds in the densely wooded hills and the clear, cold streams host a variety of native fish.

Bicycles

Many students enjoy exploring the area on mountain bikes. There is a locked and covered area for bikes to be kept, but they are still exposed to the salt air and some components may begin to rust.





Outreach

Outreach is an important part of the Ecola program. Students are encouraged, during free time, to be actively involved in Christian outreach. Through this work, students are immediately able to apply principles learned in the classroom. And as students minister to people in the community, they are strengthened in their own Christian walk.

Outreach opportunities include Child Evangelism, nursing home visitation, and church youth programs, as well as a variety of other outreaches.

Outreach requirements at Ecola are far from burdensome. One student chose to use his basketball skills to reach out to young boys in the community. Others have found personal satisfaction in their work with the homeless. The options in outreach are almost limitless.



Work Opportunities

The Cannon Beach Conference Center, from whom we lease our facilities, hires a number of students each term to help with food services and housekeeping. CBCC is also aware of the need to fit working hours between class times.

For a job application call (503) 436-1501 or write PO Box 398, Cannon Beach, OR 97110. Be sure to explain that the application is for an Ecola student.

A visit to Cannon Beach may be helpful for seeking out jobs in the community. Many retail businesses are within easy walking distance of the campus. However, work must fit Ecola's schedule since students are required to attend all classes.

Course Information

A

ll students at Ecola take the same basic course of study.

Courses include:

- Old Testament Survey
- New Testament Survey
- New Testament Epistles
- Christian Doctrine
- Apologetics
- Practical Theology
- Missions
- Hermeneutics

Each course listed is taken throughout the school year. These courses are divided into smaller sections with sections of each course being covered each term. The course listed as Old Testament Survey, for example, includes an overview plus exegetical studies of many of the books of the Old Testament. Each book is treated as a section and is taught by a different instructor.

Students at Ecola study two sections each week. Normally there are ten classroom hours for each section, making twenty hours in class each week. Classroom hours are 55 minutes in length and there are fifteen classroom hours for each hour of credit earned (pp. 17-18.)

Course Descriptions

Old Testament Survey

An overview of the Old Testament, law, history, poetry, and prophecy. Exposition of selected books and texts, including background information, authorship, dating, as well as highlights of selected books. Major themes are examined. 6 credits.

New Testament Survey

An introductory study of the New Testament. Exposition of selected books including background information. Emphasis is placed on understanding the plan of redemption and the relationship of New Testament teaching to the Christian life. 6 credits.

New Testament Epistles

Exposition of selected New Testament epistles including historical data, authorship, dating, and relevant cultural information. New testament teaching is examined in its relation to the early church in its cultural context, and the problems faced by early believers. Emphasis is placed on relevance of New Testament teaching to twentieth-century Christianity. 6 credits.

Practical Theology

An examination of Biblical teaching as it relates to key areas of Christian living. The impact of Bible doctrine on areas of the human experience such as relationships, dating and marriage, and world view. 3 credits.

Christian Doctrine

A foundational series of studies in major Bible doctrines. Emphasis is placed on the revealed persons and character of God in relation to the world, the church, and the individual believer. Other doctrinal studies include salvation, the church, and future events. 3 credits.

Apologetics

A consideration of principles and approaches to the defense of the Christian faith. Evidence is examined in specific areas such as creation. Scriptural truth is also contrasted with the teachings of the cults. 2 credits.

Missions

An introductory study of the nature, function, and worldwide mission of the Church. Along with a brief survey of world religions, individual opportunities for fulfilling the Great Commission are explored. Personal involvement in outreach is required. 4 credits.

Hermeneutics

An introductory study of the tools, approaches, and methods of Bible study. Emphasis is on principles of interpretation and dealing with problem texts. 1 credit.



Faculty

Our faculty consists of guest instructors including outstanding professors, pastors, and leading Christian speakers. We invite those who are in agreement with our statement of faith, and who have demonstrated the ability to communicate the Word accurately and effectively. Faculty teach subjects within their areas of expertise. There are usually two instructors on campus each week. Each teacher is responsible for a 10 hour section of one course.

The advantages of having faculty arrive for a short-term stay include the dynamics of an interesting and challenging course of study. Each Monday students are presented two new topics and two new instructors. Each week brings a new area of study and a fresh new teaching style.

A list of instructors may be found on pages 33 - 35. Note, however, that our teaching staff will vary somewhat each year.



Diploma

Diplomas are awarded to students who have completed the three terms of Ecola. Each student must have taken all tests and cleared all financial obligations to the school in order to graduate.

The diploma is a certificate of completion received after earning a minimum of 30 credits, described more fully on pages 13 - 18. The diploma is a valuable document when applying to missions organizations, and worth varying amounts of undergraduate credit at many Bible Colleges.

Transcripts

While grades and report cards are not issued, Ecola students are tested and given assignments, and scores are recorded for the student's transcript. For schools who grant credit to Ecola graduates, these scores become an indication of the student's academic ability and level of self-discipline.

A partial list of schools where Ecola graduates may transfer credit can be found on page 40.

A copy of the transcript will be sent directly to a registrar's office upon written request from the student. There is no charge for a transcript.

Additional Fees

Application Fee

With an application, a nonrefundable fee of \$35.00 for singles, and \$50.00 for married couples is required.

Reservation Deposit

After acceptance, a deposit of \$150.00 will reserve a spot in the classroom for students. This will be applied to tuition and is non-refundable.

Damage Deposit

A damage/cleaning deposit of \$75.00 is required prior to moving into school housing. The entire deposit will be refunded at final departure following a room inspection. Normal wear and tear is expected, but a room not cleaned or damaged may require forfeiture of all or part of this deposit.

Meal Plans

Students living on campus are required to have a Meal Plan. (In order to live off campus you must be 20 years of age.) Students must choose a meal plan three weeks prior to the beginning of each term, and cannot change meal plans until three weeks prior to the beginning of the following term. When a meal plan change is requested, the change does not go into effect until the beginning of the next term.

Meal Plan A

Meal Plan A consists of Lunch and Dinner, seven days a week.

Meal Plan B

Meal Plan B consists of Breakfast, Lunch, and Dinner, seven days a week.

Meal Plan C

Meal Plan C consists of Breakfast, Lunch, and Dinner, Monday thru Friday only. **This means no weekend meals.**

Meal Plan D

Meal Plan D consists of Lunch and Dinner, Monday thru Friday only. **This means no weekend meals.**

Financial Policy

Fees for the term are due in full on registration day unless prior arrangement has been made with Ecola's finance office.

Discounts

Paying early has benefits...

A Student paying in full for the term, two weeks prior to the first day of classes, will receive a 5% discount off the total for the term. The discount can be received for each term, as long as the term is paid in full no later than two weeks prior to the beginning of that term.

A Student paying in full for the year, two weeks prior to the beginning of Fall Term, will receive a 7.5% discount off the total cost.

The total cost for each term or for the full year varies depending on which meal plan is selected and whether the student is on or off campus. (See page 23)

Married Couple Attending...

If both members of the couple are attending Ecola Bible School, there is a discount for the second member. To calculate the total discounted cost for the married couple, take the total cost for one person and multiply it by two. (Be sure to choose the appropriate cost depending on whether or not you are on a meal plan.) Take the total you end up with and subtract the following prices.

Refunds

Full refunds are given only prior to the beginning of a term. A partial refund of one-half is given within the first three weeks, one-quarter up to five weeks, and no refund thereafter. More details on refunds may be found in the application packet.

Financial Aid

Ecola is a standard one year diploma institution striving to keep its fees as affordable as possible. For this reason, substantial school sponsored scholarships are not available and government financial aid programs generally do not apply to the Ecola program.

Missions Practicum Option

For those who have a particular interest in missions, Ecola offers exciting opportunities to get involved. From year to year, Ecola offers several missions practicum options which you can choose to be a part of. These trips generally take place each year during Spring Break, and provide first hand missions experience. Accepted participants are involved in all phases of missions including fund-raising, study of language and culture, preparation of program materials, shots, travel, etc.



This option will be a stretching, enriching, and life-changing experience. As part of the program, each student will need to



raise financial and prayer support in order to participate. A current passport is required.

Pre-trip training and the mission trip combine to give the student an additional two credits in Missions Practicum.



Youth Ministry Practicum Option

Students attending Ecola who have an interest in youth ministry have an opportunity to be on the Ecola Summer Ministry Team. The Summer Ministry option is a combination course involving classroom instruction with a summer of practical experience in youth ministry. During the spring, weekly classes will cover the basics of working in youth ministry, followed by several weeks of more intense training before the team is sent out to counsel at camps for the summer. Ecola's Summer Ministry Team is selected from among those who apply.



Ecola School of Ministry

For those who have completed the first year of Ecola, we offer a second program with a focus on ministry and missions. Weekly classes cover further Bible study and the basics of working in ministry. Participants interact with full-time staff in a variety of ministry activities. School of Ministry students are selected from among those who apply. More information and applications are available upon request.

Those completing the program receive a total of twenty-four credits for the School of Ministry program.

Statement of Faith

- We believe, as Jesus taught, that one must be born again to be saved. New birth is salvation, and is received by God's grace through faith and is in no way earned through good works or human effort. We believe that new birth is evidenced in a changed life.
- We believe that both the saved and the unsaved will be resurrected in the last days.
- We believe that those who are born again will be raised to the unimaginable pleasures of God's presence for all of eternity. We believe that those who reject God's plan for salvation will be punished in eternal separation from the goodness of God.
- We believe that the guiding purpose for believers in this life is to make disciples through the sharing of the gospel of Jesus Christ and teaching the Scriptures.
